Bronheulog Hall.

In his book *Lost Houses of Wales*¹, Thomas Lloyd describes Bronheulog as 'A classical villa for Richard Lloyd (High Sherriff 1810) with a shallow central bow on the front garden'. Richard Lloyd was, indeed, sheriff of Denbighshire in 1810², but, from a number of contemporary documents, it would appear that he was resident at Bronheulog in Llanfair Talhaiarn, near Abergele, rather than the Hall just outside Llangollen.

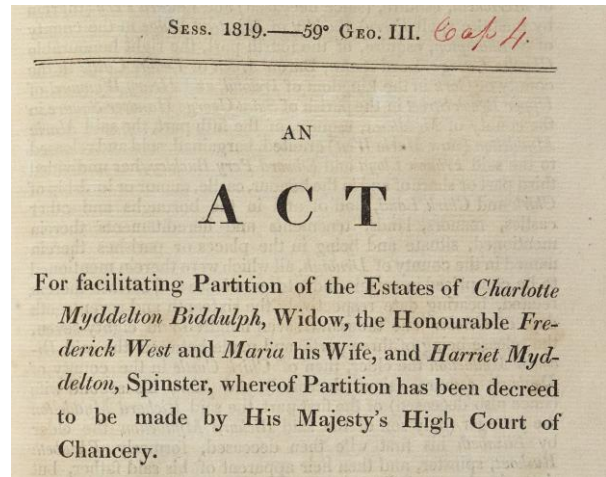


Section of the 1824 Chirk Estate map.

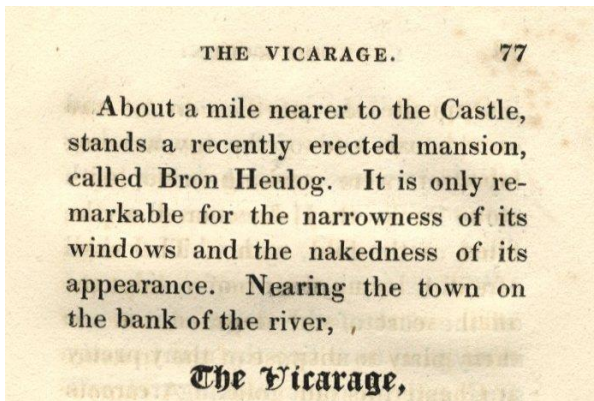
Bronheulog, on Sun Bank Llangollen, also does not seem to ever have belonged to Richard Lloyd, being listed in all of the earliest records as part of the Chirk Castle Estate. A map of the Estate drawn in 1824 (left), copied from a survey of 1791, shows a building on the site of Bronheulog (No. n32)³. Areas coloured red had been re-surveyed in 1824 and those coloured blue added in 1833.

It is clear, therefore, that there was a building on the site in 1824, but whether it was present at the time of the 1791 survey is unknown at the present time. There does appear to be a copy of the 1791 survey map at the National Library of Wales and it is hoped that it will be possible to examine that document over the coming months.

However, Bronheulog was not listed in an act of partition of 1819, when the Chirk Estate was divided between Charlotte Myddelton Biddulph, Frederick West and Maria (nee Myddelton) his wife and Harriet Myddelton, spinster. It also is not marked on a map of properties owned by the Myddelton Estate made in 1778, although other nearby properties are included.

The most definite reference as to the time of the construction of the original Hall, however, comes from a book describing Llangollen and the surrounding area, written by W.T. Simpson in 1827⁴. In that he referred to Bron Heulog as being a 'recently erected mansion', implying that it had only been built in the last few (possibly up to about 10?) years.

Not appearing in the 1819 partition, being marked on a map produced from an 1824 survey, and being referred to as recently built in 1827, leads to the conclusion that the original Bronheulog Hall was most likely built in the very early 1820s, by the Chirk Castle Estate, to rent out and generate income for the Estate.

Sadly, we do not have the list of tenants that went with the survey of 1824, and so do not know who was living there then. Bronheulog Hall (marked as Bron Haulog) would next appear on an Ordnance Survey map of 1835, but it would be three years after this when we start to be able to get more information about who owned and lived there.

The tithe map and apportionment, dating from 1838, show 'Bron Haulog' as being the property of the Honourable Frederick West (husband of Maria Myddelton of Chirk Castle) and being lived in by Robert Lawson. It has not been possible to discover anything further about Robert Lawson, but it seems likely that he was farming the 14 acres of land that made up Bronheulog.

Frederick West was born in 1767, son of Mary (née Wynyard), Countess De La Warr, and Lieutenant-General John West, 2nd Earl De La Warr, Lord Chamberlain to Queen Charlotte. He married firstly Charlotte Mitchell, the daughter and co-heiress of Richard Mitchell of Culham Court, Berkshire² on 17 April 1792. The couple had one daughter, Charlotte Louisa, but his wife died on 13 June 1795, leaving the Honourable Frederick with a life interest in the valuable property of Culham Court. Within three years, on 31 May 1798, West had married again, to Maria Myddelton, the second surviving daughter of the late Richard Myddelton, of Chirk Castle, Denbighshire and of Elizabeth Rushout, daughter of Rt Hon Sir John Rushout, Treasurer of the Navy. West moved initially into his late father-in-law's residence, Chirk Castle, styling himself the Honourable Frederick West of Chirk Castle, but also had a house in Hanover Square, London, as well as Culham Court.

William Edwards was the vicar of Llangollen from around 1849 until not long before his death in 1868. Previously the family had lived at the splendid Vicarage on Mill Street in Llangollen (later the Woodlands Hotel). However, when the railway line came to Llangollen the Vicarage was sold to the Railway Company, and a new Vicarage built below Fron Bache with the proceeds. Evidently Bronheulog served as a temporary Vicarage in the period before the new Vicarage was complete. William and Sarah's third son, Henry, went on to become the Dean of Bangor.

Following on from its time as a Vicarage, Bronheulog was occupied by the Llangollen Lime and Fluxing Stone Company, which operated the limestone quarries along the Trevor Rocks above the Sun Bank. Bronheulog was used by the company as the residence for their quarry managers. The first recorded manager was Isaac Williams, noted in the 1868 polling records as living at Bronheulog and on the 1871 census as being the manager of the limestone quarries.

Isaac Williams was born in Cefn Bychan, Ruabon parish, in 1814. By 1851 he had become a boat builder in Newbridge, living there with his second wife Jane and children Ann (3) and David (2). Another daughter, Lucretia, was born in 1856, and then the family moved to Shropshire, where Isaac became a coal agent in Shrewsbury. Two further daughters, Jane and Amelia, were born in 1858 and 1864, and then Isaac moved his family to Llangollen, where he became the manager of the limestone quarries on Sun Bank.

Isaac and his family continued to live at Bronheulog until 1878, when Isaac sadly died at the age of 64. A new manager for the limestone quarries was required and Bronheulog became home to Stephen Toye.

Originally from Cornwall, Stephen had previously been a barite miner in Shropshire. Having married Margaret Lloyd in Llanfyllin in 1872, and having two children, Robert and Emily, the couple moved to Llangollen, where Stephen became the new manager for the Llangollen Lime

and Fluxing Stone Company. A third child, Stephen, was born in 1881, after the family had moved to Bronheulog, followed by the birth of twins the following year.

Also living at Bronheulog was 57 year old widower Thomas Moore, who was originally from near Nantwich in Cheshire. He was recorded on the 1881 census as being a general labourer and servant. Just two years before, in 1879, his wife Elizabeth had died whilst they were living at the house.

In 1885, whilst Stephen Toye and his family were living at Bronheulog, there was another death at Hall. Alfred Wragge, the former manager of the Shropshire Union Canal, was a frequent visitor to the family. On this occasion he visited the Toye family with his son Edward Wragge. As soon as he arrived he excused himself to go upstairs and, whilst up there, committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver. Any possible reasons for why he may have done this were not reported by the newspapers at the time, but we can only imagine the effect that it must have had, not only on Edward Wragge, but also on Stephen Toye and his family.

SUICIDE AT BRONHEULOG.
On Saturday last, a very distressing case of suicide occurred at Bronheulog Farm, near this town. Mr. Alfred Wragge, formerly known here as manager of the Shropshire Union Canal Company, arrived at Bronheulog, the residence of Mr. Toye, on that day, in company with his son, Mr. George Edward Wragge. As soon almost as he arrived at the house he asked permission to go upstairs, and during the absence for half an hour of his son and Mr. Toye, the unfortunate gentleman put an end to his life by deliberately shooting himself with a revolver, the shot, which, entering the mouth, penetrated through the skull, and lodged in the ceiling of the room.

The 1887 rates records for Bronheulog show the Hall belonging to Colonel Robert Myddelton Biddulph and still being used by the Llangollen Lime Stone Company.

By 1891 Stephen and his family had emigrated to Nova Scotia, where Stephen and his eldest son Robert were both recorded as having become labourers. The post of quarry manager was taken over by Thomas Moore,

who had evidently progressed from being the labourer recorded in the census 10 years previously. Thomas continued to live at Bronheulog, although in 1895 he too was to pass away.

An advertisement in the local newspaper in 1891 shows a Mrs T. Jones advertising rooms to let at Bronheulog, although it is

not clear whether she (or her family) were living at the Hall with Thomas Moore or at the adjacent farm or cottage. Newspapers from 1897 record a Walter and Mrs Jones as living at Bronheulog, although it seems more likely that these articles were referring to the farm behind the Hall. On the 1901 census nobody was recorded as being at Fronheulog Hall. The enumerator did, however, mark it down as still being an inhabited dwelling. Possibly whoever lived there was simply away on the day of the census or maybe they were in the process of moving out of the Hall. The second possibility is made more likely by the appearance in the local newspaper in December of that year of a notice of the auction of furniture and decorations from Bronheulog.

Five years later, in 1906, there was another auction of paintings and furniture, but on that occasion it was noted as being items belonging to Walter P. Jones. This would seem to support the idea that Walter Jones was not living at the Hall, but at one of the other houses at Bronheulog, as there would be no need for he and his family to sell off all of the furniture and other goods in 1906 if they had already disposed of them in 1901!

Unfortunately it has not been possible to discover who the occupants of the Hall were directly following Thomas Moore. However, 1911 saw Richard Myddelton of Chirk Castle put up for auction a large swathe of the estate, including the whole village of Chirk, fishing rights in the River Dee, Bronheulog House and land near Llangollen.

The auction took place in the Parish Hall in Chirk on the 18th July 1911. Bronheulog was listed with land totalling 33 acres, a small portion of the total 1317 acres that were being sold.

It would appear, however, that Bronheulog was not sold at the auction, as documents from fifteen years later indicate that Richard Myddelton still had an interest in the property (see below).

It would appear, however, that Bronheulog had been put into a trust, managed on behalf of the Myddelton family by trustees, most likely in order to release funds to the family, whilst still maintaining some control over the asset.

The next occupants of Bronheulog that we know of were the Evans family. The 1911 census records Frances Evans and seven of her children. The Evans family had moved to Llangollen from Sale in Cheshire, where Frances' husband, James, had been a mechanical engineer. James had died in 1904, which possibly prompted the move of the family. Evidently the family were well off, as only the youngest son Harry was recorded on the census as working, being a foundry engineer.

The beginning of 1914 saw the occasion of the wedding of Frances' fourth daughter Florrie to John Ernest Jones of Park House in Acrefair. Florrie was noted on the marriage record as living at Bronheulog, and her father James' (deceased) occupation was recorded as Gentleman.

The marriage of Florrie Evans and John Jones on the 1st January 1914.

The Evans family remained at Bronheulog until the year after Florrie's marriage. An advertisement in the Llangollen Advertiser in April 1915 recorded the auction of household items at Bronheulog, noting that the sale was on the instruction of Mrs Evans "who is leaving".

Following the departure of Frances Evans and her family, Bronheulog became the home to Emily Green and her son Richard. Emily had been born in 1876 in Feltham, Middlesex, where, in 1900, she had married Edward Henry Green. They then moved to Edgbaston in Birmingham, where Richard was born in 1902. Over the next 30 years the family moved to Kenilworth, Warwick and Tormoham in Devon, before moving to Bronheulog. Over that period Richard's five brothers, Phillip, John, Edward, Alan, and David, were born.

The 1921 census showed 46 year old Emily at Bronheulog, along with her eldest son, Richard, and two visitors. Edward was evidently just away at the time of the census, as Emily is noted as married. On the 1921 census John Herbert Green (13), Richards' brother, was recorded as being at Arden House Preparatory School for boys in Henly in Arden, as was Edward (15), Alan (9) and David (8). All were boarders. Brother Phillip (17) was at college in Great Malvern.

The conveyance in 1926 when Bronheulog was sold away from the Myddelton Estate.

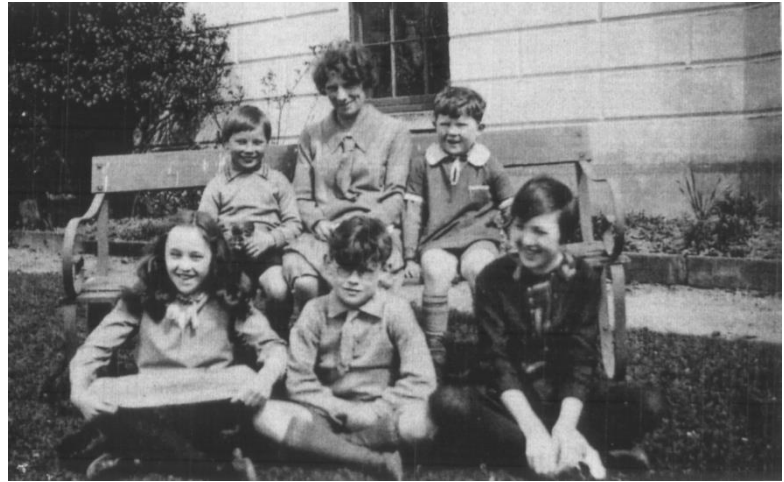
A major change would come at Bronheulog on the 19th October 1926, with the sale of the Hall away from the Myddelton Estate. A conveyance from that date shows Robert Edward Myddelton selling the property to George William Ridley and Walter Ridley.

George and Walter were brothers, sons of George and Elizabeth Ridley (nee McCaffrey). George had been born in Winton in 1874 and his brother two years later in Preston. George was an architect and William an estate manager. Although they were recorded as 'being of Bronheulog' in the conveyance, it seems more likely that

the purchase of the Hall was an investment, as, just a year later Bronheulog was being rented out. The tenants who moved in in 1927 were the Scott-Archer family. Son Mike Scott Archer detailed his memories. "Our first home here was Plas Ifan, near Bryn Hywel, where we moved in 1924. My father was an English graduate of Bangor University and taught English at Ruabon Grammar School throughout the period 1920 to 1947. My mother was a graduate in Latin and English and had also been a teacher until they married in 1922. We moved to Bronheulog cottage in about 1927, and by 1928 we had moved into Bronheulog Hall, where my mother opened a small private school which had about five or six local children of 4 or 5 years age".

I have a few vivid memories of the three years here. Climbing onto the bedroom mantelpiece behind the bedhead (the bedroom fire place was not used), hiding under a rhododendron just beside the front door while parents and maid searched everywhere, dropping a brick onto the porcelain loo after being scolded for some misdemeanour. I had family walks or trips which

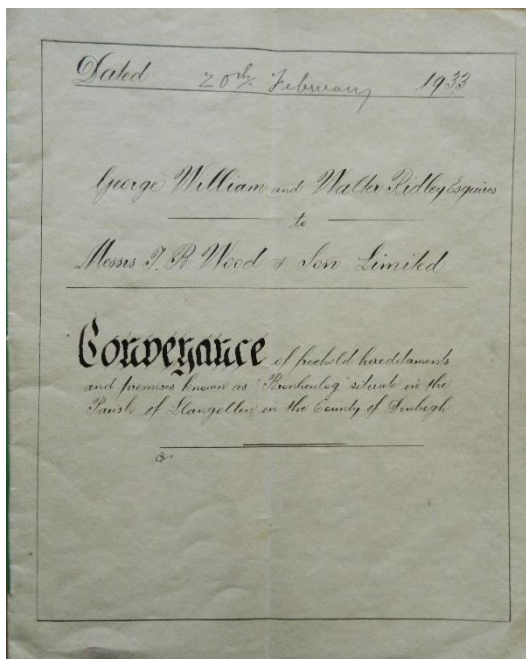
were memorable. The great spring frost of 1929 is remembered for the maid taking me half a mile along the hillside and down the lane to the canal at Sunbank where I saw the boatman breaking the ice for the limestone barge horse to have a drink. There was an incline from the Eglwyseg quarries down to Sunbank which brought the limestone. The maid persuaded the quarryman to give us a ride back up the incline in the empty limestone wagon.

In the following summer my mother walked with me up the lane to the road called Panorama Walk below the quarries and from there to the top of Castell Dinas Brân. On the top there was a Camera Obscura which showed an enlarged view of the countryside on a flat table inside the conical building. The lady rotated the Camera to show our home, Bronheulog, and my mother exclaimed 'look - there's Gwladys putting the washing out!'. The quarries were probably then in their last years; I remember seeing the wagons coming along the tramway by the Panorama Walk and then the contents being transferred at the top of the incline.

In the autumn of 1930, we moved to Bryn Derwen in Abbey Road.



1933 saw another change in ownership of Bronheulog, when George and Walter Ridley sold the property to Messrs T.B. Wood and Son Ltd of Middleton, Lancashire, for £1,850. At the time of the sale George was living in Rock Ferry and Walter in Farnham, so it seems probable that they never actually lived in the house at all.

T.B. Wood and Son Ltd was a cotton spinning company that had been set up around 1857 by Thomas B. Wood. Born in 1870, since at least 1914 William Martin Wiggins had been the managing director of T.B Wood and Son. Mayor of Middleton between 1914 and 1919, in 1925 he became the MP for Oldham. He was, at one time, president of the Federation of Master Cotton Spinners Associations

and president of International Federation of Cotton Spinners and Manufacturers. He was also sometime president of the British Employers' Confederation. It would seem that the company had purchased Bronheulog for he and his wife Elizabeth. The key figure in the company, in 1943 the company name was changed to W.M. Wiggins Ltd.

Having lived at the Hall for six years, in 1939, with the outbreak of World War Two, Martin and Elizabeth moved into the nearby Bron Heulog Cottage, in order to make the Hall available for evacuees to use. Very sadly, on Friday 22nd September, a fire started in the Hall and, in spite of the best efforts of the fire service, the building was totally gutted.

Martin and Elizabeth never restored or moved back into Bronheulog Hall. In November 1946 W.M. Wiggins Ltd. sold the gutted building, along with Bronheulog

Cottage, Tŷ Newydd and all of the land, to jeweller Percival Walter Hulbert and his wife Marie, of 23 Bridge Street, Llangollen for the sum of £3,000. They in turn, in December 1950, sold Bronheulog Cottage, plus one and a quarter acres of the land, to Oswald Sewell Sharratt.

In 1952, Percival Hulbert applied for permission to erect a 'bungalow' on top of the footprint of the remaining walls of Bronheulog Hall. The proposed building was not a true bungalow, as it had a single storey on one side and two stories on the side facing across the valley. In December of that year the plans were sanctioned by the Building Bye-Laws Committee and planning consent was granted in February 1953. In the applications, Percival was listed as being of Bronheulog, but it seems more likely that he and his wife Marie were still living in Bridge Street throughout the time of the restoration. Another complicating factor is that Marie's father, Francis Evans, was recorded as being 'of Bronheulog Hall' when he died in 1951 in Barmouth. Possibly the plan was for him to live there with his daughter and son in law when the restoration was complete.

In April 1953, Percival sold off a further 15 of the 17 acres of Bronheulog land to Oswald Sewell Sharratt, who was then living in the Cottage, Bronheulog, for £700. Also included in the sale was the cottage known as Tŷ Newydd, which was at that time 'in the occupation of Llewelyn Lewis'.

Upon completion of the new, now much reduced in height, Bronheulog restoration, Percival and

Marie renamed the property Yr Olygfa. It seems that they never actually lived there, because when Percival sold the newly restored house in March 1960, he was recorded as formerly of 23 Bridge Street Llangollen but now of Braeside, Northfield Lane South, Brixham.

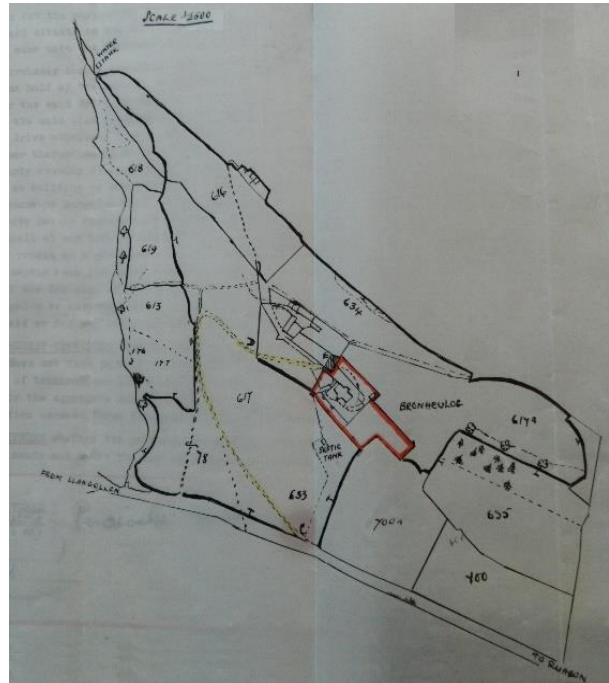
With Percival by then retired, he and Marie had evidently decided to enjoy their later years in Devon. She died in 1972, followed by Percival in 1980, leaving an estate worth about £45,000 (around £250,000 in today's money).

At the sale in 1960, Yr Olygfa was bought by Albert George Reeves of Abbey Dingle, Llangollen, for £3,250. Renaming the house Frondirion, it would appear that he lived there for nearly 30 years. When he sold the house in 1989, the conveyance included a statement by Albert, saying:-

I Albert George Reeves, of Frondirion, Sun Bank, Llangollen, Clwyd, do solemnly and sincerely declare as follows:-

I am the owner of the property known as Frondirion, Sun Bank, Llangollen formerly known as Olygfa Bronheulog Llangollen and such property was conveyed to me by a Deed of Conveyance dated the 10th day of March 1960 and made between Percival Walter Hulbert of the one part and myself of the other part.

I have occupied the said property known as Frondirion since I purchased the same in 1960.

Born in 1917 in Small Heath, Birmingham, Albert George (Bert) Reeves became a chemist. He lived with his parents in the Yardley area of the city and in 1939 was recorded as being an ARP warden and ambulance driver. He came to work in Llangollen, becoming Managing Director of the Horticultural and Botanical Association, based in Dee Mills. He was an active member of the local community, being in the Rotary, president of the cricket club and holding several positions on the Eisteddfod Committee.

When sold by Albert Reeves in June 1989, Frondirion was purchased by Henry Peter Herbert O'Brien and his wife Valerie (nee Jenks). Born in Barrow-In-Furness, Lancashire, in 1934, Peter and Valerie, who had been born in Mauritius in 1937, had married in Dorset in 1957 and had four children. Peter would, however, only enjoy living at Frondirion for just under three years, as in May 1992 he died.

25th October 1878

MEMORIAM: MR. ISAAC WILLIAMS. —

We have the sad duty of reporting the unexpected death of our late esteemed and genial-neighbour, Mr. Isaac Williams, Bronheulog. He felt indisposed on Sunday week, but no fears were entertained with regard to him even up to the last evening of his life. He had enjoyed such uniformly good health, that his numerous friends were utterly unprepared to receive the sad news of his death, which took place on Tuesday evening. Mr Williams was a native of Cefn Bychan and was born about 1812. For many years he had been part of the Llangollen Fluxing Stone works. At one time he was manager of the Glyn Granite Quarry occupied thus, an important position neighbourhood, and it is to be feared that his life has, to some extent at least, been sacrificed to his sense of duty, for he worked very hard to discharge his various duties to the full satisfaction of his own scrupulous conscience. For several years Mr. Williams occupied the office of deacon at Penybryn Chapel. None will mourn his loss more sincerely and deeply than his pastor and fellow-deacons, whose confidence and love he possessed most thoroughly. His kind and instructive words will long be missed by his Sunday school class. He seems to have been specially attached to his scholars, and, we need hardly say, his attachment was warmly reciprocated. His powerful memory, extensive acquaintance in the Scriptures, and his affable disposition, made him a valuable and beloved member of the church and Sunday school. He leaves a widow and seven daughters, beside a numerous circle of friends, to mourn his loss. Much sympathy is felt in the neighbourhood for Mrs. Williams and her daughters. May their last end be like his.

All persons indebted to the said estate are required to forthwith pay over the amounts due from them.

SUICIDE AT BRONHEULOG.

On Saturday last, a very distressing case of suicide occurred at Bronheulog Farm, near this town. Mr. Alfred Wragge, formerly known here as manager of the Shropshire Union Canal Company, arrived at Bronheulog, the residence of Mr. Toye, on that day, in company with his son, Mr. George Edward Wragge. As soon almost as he arrived at the house he asked permission to go upstairs, and during the absence for half an hour of his son and Mr. Toye, the unfortunate gentleman put an end to his life by deliberately shooting himself with a revolver, the shot, which, entering the mouth, penetrated through the skull, and lodged in the ceiling- of the room. On Monday, an inquest was held on the body at the Sun Inn, Trevor, before Mr. B. H. Thelwall, coroner, and the following jury :-Messrs. Edward Edwards, auctioneer (foreman) James Clarke, accountant; E. H. Mathews, grocer E. H. Roberts Joseph Evans, Sun Inn E. Morris, builder; John Roberts, Osborne House T. O. Williams, draper John Cochrane; Thomas Jones, Trevor; John Edwards, Sun Inn; and J. B. Jagger. The jury, having viewed the body, which was lying at Bron-heulog, returned to the inn, where the following evidence was taken :—Mr. George Ed. Wragge, having been sworn, said I am a merchant, living I at West Dulwich, London. Deceased was my father. He now lived retired at Oakfield, Trimbottom-road, Bedford. He was formerly a brick merchant. Up to Saturday he had been staying with his sister in Chester for three weeks. He has been in bad health for the last three years in fact, he was so bad that he had to put his affairs into the hands of my mother, who acts on his behalf. On Friday I attended a meeting of directors at Shrews- bury. I went over to see my father in Cheshire, and stayed there that night, but not with him. I had asked him to accompany me to Llangollen the following day, but he declined, stating it was too much for him. To my surprise, however, on Satur- day morning, he came up to me when I was taking a ticket in Chester station. We came to Llangollen station and drove to Bronheulog. On arriving there he asked to go upstairs, and

Mr. Toye and I went to see the kilns. On our return in about half an hour we found him in the bedroom quite dead, sitting in a chair. He was suffering from suppressed gout. I know the pistol produced, having seen it in his safe at Chester, about ten years ago. He had reason to have it then, as there had been a case of burglary there about 15 years ago. I am perfectly satisfied that his mind was affected. He was perfectly sane upon everything except one thing, and that was his business.-In reply to the coroner it was stated that deceased was about 55 years of age.—Mr. Stephen Toye said he was manager of the Llangollen Lime and Fluxing Stone Company. He had known Mr. Wragge for about seven years. He last saw him alive at Bronheulog on Saturday. He and Mr. Wragge's son went to see the kilns, leaving deceased upstairs in the house. He had been staying several times at Bronheulog before, and the last time he was in very bad health. He (witness) went upstairs at the request of the son to wake him up, as he thought he was asleep, it being his usual habit to take a rest in the afternoon. He had no suspicion of anything being wrong, and knocking the door, called upon him, but there was no reply. He then went into the room and found him sitting in a chair, with a pistol in his hand. There was a great deal of blood on him. He went for the doctor immediately. The pistol was loaded in all the chambers except one. Deceased was ill, but not to that extent that it was considered necessary to watch him.After a very short consultation, the jury returned a verdict to the effect that deceased came to his death by shooting himself with a revolver which had befallen them, as the deceased had for years been well known in this neighbourhood as a man of strict business integrity and a gentleman of the most genial and affable disposition.
